

DENTAL HEALTH FOR YOUR CAT: SHOULD YOU USE A PRODUCT WITH PEPPERMINT?

When I was there I asked an employee where their dental products were for cats and she started to recommend the gel to me. This led to a trip to the counter where the computers are and a 20-30 minute Google search to see what we could find out. She mentioned she has been using the product on her cats for many years too. We didn't come up with any clear answer but she is under the impression that peppermint is only harmful to their lungs if they ingest it. She also thought she read or heard somewhere that the peppermint oil used in cat products isn't a high level. Color me still confused but I felt better knowing another person has been using the same product for many years too and hasn't had any known problems.
